- 1 The Singing Mural 2011**
■ C.F. Payne & Jenny Ustick
1223 Central Parkway
Created in partnership with Cincinnati Opera, this mural is an ode to the Queen City's rich arts and cultural legacy. Seek & find performing arts favorites including Tchaikovsky's Nutcracker, Aida, Maestro Erich Kunzel, Mr. Rogers, Pagliacci, Cincinnati broadcasting legend Ruth Lyons, and the Cincinnati Reds' own Mr. Redlegs.
- 2 The Vision of Samuel Hannaford 2009**
■ Scott Donaldson | 1308 Race Street
■ The guy in the picture on the piano is famed architect, Samuel Hannaford, and the buildings outside the window are the iconic Cincinnati buildings he designed, including Music Hall, City Hall, and Elsinore Tower. Take time to take in all the details.
- 3 The Golden Muse 2012**
■ Tim Parsley | 28 West 13th Street
■ This figurine—based on an 18th-century mantel clock at the Taft Museum of Art—is surrounded by the soaring music of Aaron Copland's *Fanfare for the Common Man*, composed for the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra and first performed at Music Hall.
- 4 The Cincinnati Strongman:**
■ Henry Holtgrewe 2014
Jason Snell | 1215 Vine Street
You can't help but flex your muscles when looking at this mural of Cincinnati strongman Henry Holtgrewe, a strong but gentle giant who lived and worked in the neighborhood. This mural tells his story and his many amazing feats of strength including lifting the entire Cincinnati Reds team! Now that is some serious muscle.
- 5 Energy & Grace 2013**
■ Kim Krause & Nathan Weikert
■ 16 East 12th Street
ArtWorks' first abstract mural, located next to the Art Academy of Cincinnati, is based on the work of longtime Art Academy professor Kim Krause. If you study at the Art Academy, maybe ArtWorks' next mural will be based on your work!
- 6 No Place Like Home 2013**
■ Kenton Brett | 27 West 12th Street
Recognizable household items radiate from the center of this mural to mimic a mandala, a traditional circular art form. You may take these items for granted, but they are hugely important—and often out of reach—for the impoverished and homeless. Tender Mercies hopes this mandala serves as a tender reminder of those in need in our community.
- 7 Ice Cream Daydream 2010**
■ Amanda Checco | 33 East 12th St
■ This fantastical mural brings youthful energy and vibrancy to the district of Over-the-Rhine. A love for color and candy awaken the imagination. Yes, it's raining strawberries, and yes, those are desserts growing in the garden.
- 8 Canal At Vine Street Circa 1900 2007**
■ Michael Blankenship | 1100 Race Street
■ This mural celebrates the Miami and Erie Canal, which transported freight from Cincinnati to Toledo at 4–5 miles an hour. Today's I-75 follows the old canal route between the two cities, and coincidentally, also often moves at 4–5 miles an hour.
- 9 Mr. Tarbell Tips His Hat 2009**
■ Tim Parsley | 1109 Vine Street
■ We always said former vice mayor Jim Tarbell was larger than life, and this mural proves it! Here "Mr. Cincinnati" is dressed as Peanut Jim Shelton, the peanut vendor who famously served his Crosley Field customers wearing a tuxedo and top hat. Hats off to you, Jim!
- 10 The Face of the Arts 2007**
■ Tim Parsley | 101 West Central Parkway
■ It's good to be first! This mural was ArtWorks' first in the downtown area, and it celebrates the creative potential of the students at the School for Creative and Performing Arts (SCPA), located right across the street. Can you name any famous graduates of SCPA?
- 11 Fresh Harvest 2012**
■ Jonathan Queen | 1014 Vine Street
■ This mural by Cincinnati realist Jonathan Queen brings the essence of farm-to-table to a monumental scale. The vibrant colors and dense composition add a modern flair to this traditional theme. This mural honors the headquarters of the Kroger Co. for providing Cincinnatians with access to fresh, local produce since 1883. Yum!
- 12 What's Happening Downtown 2008**
■ Ted Hendricks | 1005 Walnut Street
■ "What's happening?" It's not just a 70s TV show. In this mural, people look out their windows to see what's happening in the city around them. The window designs are inspired by lintels and sills found in Cincinnati.
- 13 Riverside Vineyard 2008**
■ Tim Parsley | 908 Race Street
■ ArtWorks' first landscape mural is based on a Cincinnati Art Museum painting by Godfrey Frankenstein. To date, no driver has attempted to drive into the painting, but there's still time.
- 14 Homecoming (Blue Birds) 2012**
■ Charley Harper & Jenny Ustick
■ 119 East Court Street
Charley Harper, one of Cincinnati's most accomplished and celebrated artists, studied and taught at the Art Academy of Cincinnati. This work is based on his *Homecoming (Bluebirds)*, a symbolic painting depicting two bluebirds—male and female—returning home.
- 15 Cincinnati's Table 2011**
■ Scott Donaldson | 713 Vine Street
■ Painted on the side of local culinary legend Jean-Robert de Cavell's restaurant, Jean-Robert's Table, this mural celebrates the culinary arts in Cincinnati with a food table of its own...and what a feast it is! Flying pig shank, anyone? Merci! Merci! Jean-Robert for making Cincinnati's culinary scene TRÈS MAGNIFIQUE!
- 16 Martha, the Last Passenger Pigeon 2013**
■ John A. Ruthven & Tim Parsley
■ 15 East Eighth Street
ArtWorks' largest mural to date features wildlife artist and Cincinnati John A. Ruthven's *Martha, the Last Passenger Pigeon*. ArtWorks partnered with the Cincinnati Nature Center to share this impressive work with the world and to honor Cincinnati's long-time commitment to conservation. Martha (depicted at the top right), the last of the passenger pigeon species, died in 1914 at the Cincinnati Zoo and Botanical Garden. ArtWorks is very grateful to the Otto M. Budig Family Foundation, which generously supported the creation of this mural.
- 17 Tom Wesselmann: Still Life #60 2014**
■ Tom Wesselmann & Joe Hedges
■ 811 Main Street
Inspired by *Still Life #60* by Tom Wesselmann—world-renowned artist and Cincinnati native—this mural suggests the presence of a person by displaying objects commonly found in a purse or on a nightstand. Who do you think could be the owner of these objects?
- 18 The Hands that Build Our City 2013**
■ Jenny Ustick | 525 Elm Street
Need a hand? These hands mimic those of the workers in the famous Winold Reiss mosaics in Cincinnati's Union Terminal, with the addition of contemporary hands that signify the building of Cincinnati's future. While it looks like mosaic tile, the mural's medium is paint.
- 19 The Cobbler's Apprentice Plays Ball 2011**
■ Frank Duveneck & Tim Parsley
120 East Freedom Way
Inspired by Cincinnati painter Frank Duveneck's *The Cobbler's Apprentice*, this mural celebrates not only the original painting—hanging in the Taft Museum of Art—but also the nearby Reds Stadium. GO REDS!!!
- 20 Newport Aquarium Mural 2014**
■ Rosalind Tallmadge
1 Aquarium Way, Newport, KY
This larger-than-life mural was painted in celebration of Newport Aquarium's 15th Anniversary. With 70 exhibits and 14 galleries, the Aquarium showcases animals from all around the world in 1 million gallons of water.
- 21 The Divine Proportion of All Things 2010**
■ Tina Westerkamp
714 Washington Avenue, Covington, KY
This mural illustrates the land's bounty and the interconnected elements of life: water, earth and air—symbolizing how we depend on each other to live in harmony. Note the rich, layered glazes and repetition of the "Golden Section," a curved symbol used in art, architecture, science and math. Take time to take it all in—there's a lot going on here.
- 22 Kentucky Natural History 2013**
■ Joe Hedges | 24 E. 5th Street, Covington, KY
This series of murals celebrates northern Kentucky's wildlife, including the cardinal, which—fun fact—is Kentucky's official state bird. ArtWorks is very appreciative of Kerry Collision Center's support and partnership which helped bring this mural to life.
